
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

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One 'Say' at a Time: Or How I Learned to **Quit Worrying and Love Public Speaking**

When Mr. Sponsor casually asked me to give the opening talk to a Saturday night meeting at which he was the featured speaker, I panicked inside. But I didn't show it. I tried to be cool. At 60. though, I am the opposite of cool-a jittery, shy, self-conscious speaker. "Sure thing," I gulped. Never say no to an AA request, right? This would be my first public speaking attempt. I had spoken at a couple H&I panels, but this would be different: standing before strangers, alcoholics and addicts who weren't locked up.

The first thing I did was to accidentally forget it. My remaining brain cells deleted all memory of it until Mr. Sponsor called to remind me the big night was a day away. This was an advantage for a first-timer because it gave me little time to worry, or write, or memorize anything. I was not in anxiety-mode because I told myself that whether I worried or not, the speech would work out the way my Higher Power intended. The big night arrived, and I amazingly lacked the sense of urgency, fear or nervousness I expected. I was hardly calm but then I began imagining the audience as my BFF's in the way a 19year-old treasures such friendships. My fears melted like the ice in my last cocktail.

The 10-minute talk stretched into a 15minute commitment when the meeting's leader announced I would speak for a quarter-hour. Yikes! I brought a blank piece of paper to kick it off, introducing it as my portable Higher Power that ensures I will never travel alone. The crowd seemed pleased, and from there I talked from a place that excluded my mind. It was mainly a "drunk-alog," tracing the usual: my disastrous trail of booze, drugs and misery that cost me marriages, children, jobs, mental health and close encounters with suicide.

Without notes, I switched off the brain and switched on the heart. I spoke with deep honesty, miraculously without repeating myself. My shyness evaporated. So did my fear of messing up, embarrassing myself and being laughed at. There were laughs, but they came at appropriate times.

What I learned and what I can advise other speakers from my experience and watching Mr. Sponsor:

- •Try for a friendly speech that has a sincere undertone while injecting hope.
- •Try to not get carried away with prespeech worries that will only detract from your message.
- Try to streamline your message by not depending so much on the drunk-a-log but more on recovery.
- •Stay in the here and now.
- •Remember that your mind is where the problem lies. The solution exists somewhere in Step Three.

The gratitude I feel towards Mr. Sponsor for pushing me into the uncharted waters of extemporaneous speaking cannot be quantified. Without gratitude, I wouldn't be looking forward to one day at a time and a future of one "say" at a time. Larry J - Ventura




The Grapevine is timeless! Articles written ten or twenty years ago are still fresh and inspiring.

A Review of Tradition #5

Each group has but one primary purpose to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers.

- Do I ever cop out by saying, "I'm not a group, so that Tradition doesn't apply to me"?
- Am I willing to explain firmly to a newcomer the limitations of AA help, even if he gets mad at me for not giving him a loan?
- Have I today imposed on any AA member for a special favor or consideration simply because I am a fellow alcoholic?
- Am I willing to twelfth-step the next newcomer without regard to who or what is in it for me?
- Do I help my group in every way I can, to fulfill our primary purpose?
- Do I remember that AA old-timers, too, can be alcoholics who still suffer? Do I try both to help them and to learn from them?

Living Step # 5

"Admitted to God, to ourselves, and to another human being the exact nature of our wrongs."

All of AA's Twelve Steps ask us to go contrary to our natural desires...they all deflate our egos. When it comes to ego deflation, few of the Steps are harder to take than Step five. But scarcely any Step is more necessary to the alcoholic's longtime sobriety and peace of mind than this one

Our AA experience has taught us we can not live alone with our pressing problems and the character defects which cause or aggravate them. If we have swept the searchlight of Step four over our past lives, it has revealed in stark relief those experiences we'd rather not remember. If we have come to know how wrong thinking and actions have hurt us and others, then the need to guit living alone with those tormenting ghosts of the past becomes more urgent than ever.

Step five gives us the opportunity to share the dark secrets of our past and move on in our recovery.
