

Our Central Office Manager

Last month I had the pleasure of interviewing our Ventura County Central Office Manager, Matthew. It was great to get to know more about him, and the important work that he does. Below is our interview.

How long have you been the office manager?

"Seven years now."

How did you get the position?

"My predecessor, Leo, who was the office manager for many years had health issues. A friend of mine knew the position was opening and thought that my skillset would be a good match. My job right before this I was the managing director of a science center. At the science center it was me, one other employee, and all volunteers. The move was actually a linear kind of move for running a non-profit with all volunteers."

Steps, Traditions & Concepts

Step 5

Admitted to God, to ourselves, and to another human being the exact nature of our wrongs.

Tradition 5 (short form)

Each group has but one primary purpose-to carry the message to the alcoholic who still suffers.

Concept 5 (short form)

Throughout our structure, a traditional "Right of Appeal" ought to prevail, so that minority opinion will be heard and personal grievances receive careful consideration.

What was it like taking on the position of office manager?

"Especially at the beginning, people have an idea what it's like, they'll joke, 'oh, the president of A.A.' I've corrected everybody. I don't like that sound. I'm simply the keeper of the flame. I'm here at this desk to help the business part of A.A. run seamlessly so hopefully other people don't even see that part of it. Our stress should never be seen by our members. What it takes to accomplish running central office, the issues and problems, should never interfere with an alcoholic coming through that door."

What's changed over the time you've held the position?

"There was a big shift when the pandemic hit. I have never seen A.A. be, unfortunately, as politicized as it has been. More controversy in A.A. right off the bat, people turned to the central office and were asking me to create policy, 'you need to tell people what to do'. I'm not the A.A. police. I'm not here to tell you what to do. I'm not here to tell you what your group needs to do. Some people don't understand that."

"I was updating things every day. It was constantly changing. All along the way people were wanting me to create policy. Other intergroup offices did. I believe it goes against the tradition of group autonomy."

"As office manager, I've got no opinion on what you do in your meeting. I feel once I show up at a meeting people want me to be the office manager. They want someone to be the mediator, the decision maker. I felt I couldn't go to meetings and just be."

Founder's Day

"A co-founder of Alcoholics Anonymous. The birth of our Society dates from his [Dr. Bob's] first day of permanent sobriety, June 10, 1935." (A.A., p. 171)

Excerpt from Dr. Bob's Nightmare

That was June 10, 1935, and that was my last drink. As I write nearly four years has passed...

It is the most wonderful blessing to be relieved of the terrible curse with which I was afflicted. My health is good and I have regained my selfrespect and the respect of my colleagues. My home life is ideal and my business is as good as can be expected in these uncertain times. I spend a great deal of time passing on what I learned to others who want and need it badly. I do it for four reasons:

- 1. Sense of duty
- 2. It is a pleasure.
- 3. Because in so doing I am paying my debt to the man who took time to pass it on to me.
- 4. Because every time I do it I take out a little more insurance for myself against a possible slip.

...if you really and truly want to quit drinking liquor for good and all, and sincerely feel that you must have some help, we know that we have an answer for you. It never fails, if you go about it with one half the zeal you have been in the habit of showing when you were getting another drink. (A.A., p. 180-181)

Interview Continued

So, what do you see your job as office manager being in that regard?

"I believe that one of the strongest things I do at the office is that when people call, I try to point them to the resources that will give them the answers, 'that sounds like you're talking about tradition...here's the literature."

Is it hard separating yourself from the job?

"When I first took the job as office manager my sponsor told me, 'Don't give up your personal commitments, don't give up your program. Too many people see a job like this as their program. So, when I go to an A.A. meeting I'm going as an alcoholic because I need to be in a meeting. One thing I love is going to online meetings, over in Europe or wherever. I can go on my time, and no one knows me as the office manager."

"I meet with all the central office managers across the country every Friday morning. We have an open Zoom meeting. It is a unique job with unique issues."

What do you think makes a good office manager?

"Probably one of the biggest traits you need to have as a central office manager is patience. There are repeat callers. There is one caller who has called for years. At some point you've just got to say, 'ok, how can I help you?' I've been listening to you for the last half-an-hour, and we're always there to listen to the still sick and suffering alcoholic, but when that person has called over-and-over at 2am, 4am and they're drinking, you've just got to say, 'Go to sleep. Call me in the morning'. I can't give medical advice, but I tell someone to get medical attention, 'Hang up the phone. Call 911. Go to a hospital."

"One of the things we don't get enough of is the other side of the phone call, a previous caller saying 'Hey, you guys were there for us.' We don't know if they took our advice. We don't know if they made it to that meeting or not."

Are all office managers also members of A.A.?

They are. In our central office bylaws, it states that the office manager has to be a sober member of alcoholics anonymous. I'm not sure if all central offices have that as part of their bylaws, but yes, all the office managers are sober.

How long have you been sober?

"15 years".

What's the best part about the job?

"When you get down to the rewarding part of helping that alcoholic. To know that the job that I do, and the effort that I put into it provides that infrastructure for that person to call in the middle of the night and get help."

What's the worst part of the job?

"People that call my personal cell on a Sunday. Call me on Monday. The toughest thing is creating boundaries and personal space in a job that, at times, requires 24-hour service. There are times that you just want to be away from it all."

What's it like managing so many volunteers?

"That's not too difficult because it's what I was doing in my previous job. It's tough when you don't have phone volunteers on the weekend. It's challenging to keep enough volunteers to keep it covered."

"Unlike a lot of central offices, I give the volunteers a lot of responsibility. A lot of other offices have another paid employee. At other offices volunteers don't sell literature. All they do is answer the phone. When I take vacations, I know the volunteers know what they are doing. I feel very confident in our volunteers."

Do you think you'll do this job for a long time to come?

"I've got no plans to stop."
